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Background (sector)

- Over 400, 000 older people living and dying in care homes in England.
- Many depend on care homes to meet their basic needs in the last years of their life.
- Research with users and families calls for indicators of quality that reflect 'quality of life' as well as 'care'.
- Social care system has been chronically underfunded for years and most care is undertaken by unregulated, low paid care workers.

Background(staff)

- Unlike in NHS, regulated professionals (e.g. RNs, OTs, social workers) make up the minority.
- Historically, no standardised training for care workers
- CQC expectation that direct care-workers will have been assessed as competent in skills outlined in Care Certificate:

- Measuring quality of care in care homes in ways that are useful to care home providers, regulators and commissioners.
- Some emphasis on role of care staff.
- 3 year study (July 2017-August 2020)

Study Aims

- Develop new measures for pain, anxiety and depression for use with care home residents unable to self-report (WP1).
- Pilot and psychometrically test the new measures alongside the Adult Social Care Outcomes Toolkit (ASCOT) (WP2).
- Explore the relationship between regulator quality ratings and residents' social care related quality of life (WP2 & 3).
- Understand how skill mix and employment conditions matter for care home quality (WP3).
